Proposed FY 2015–2018 Water and Sewer Rates

The San Francisco Public Utilities Commission is once again proposing higher rates for water and wastewater service and to fund its ongoing capital programs. We are currently in the 5th year of a 5-year rate cycle during which rates have risen every year. The Commission adopted the current rates in May 2009, effective July 1, 2009.

The staff-proposed rates, if adopted by the Commission in May 2014, will take effect July 1, 2014. The proposed rates are for a 4-year cycle, until July 1, 2018. Residential retail rates are proposed to rise 8.5% each year for 4 years; about 40%. So if you have a \$100.00 monthly bill now, you will pay about \$140.00 in FY 2017–2018. In 2018 and for years thereafter, rates will rise even more, as we ramp up the sale of revenue bonds to finance the gigantic \$7.0 Billion Sewer System Improvement Program.

At our Feb. 18th CSFN meeting, SFPUC staff will present their reasons for the proposed rate hikes for the next 4 years. CSFN Water Task Force is pleased to host Todd Rydstrom, SFPUC Chief Financial Officer, accompanied by Tyrone Jue, Director of Communications, who will make the case for the new rates.

Utility rate-setting is an extremely complicated endeavor. Rate administrators spend their working lives becoming expert in this field. How can the average ratepayer possibly determine whether proposed rate hikes are reasonable, necessary, and fair?

State Proposition 218 requires that all fees imposed by a public agency must not be any greater than the "cost of service" to the individual. The Bighorn-Desert View State Supreme Court Case clarified that water and sewer rates are property-related fees and

subject to Prop. 218. Therefore, rates cannot exceed the true cost of delivering water and wastewater service to the individual property.

The Water Task Force has been studying SFPUC issues for years and will ask questions of the presenters to clarify issues. The Water Task Force championed the adoption of capacity fees, which assure that new development pays it own way. How much revenue has been collected and how has it been spent since implementation in 2007? The Water Task Force in its Fight the Family Tax campaign fought against adoption of tiered rates. Recent Court decisions ruled that tiered rates are illegal under Prop 218. Why is the SFPUC waiting until 2017–2018 to adopt a uniform rate?

How does the SFPUC calculate the true cost of service to deliver one unit of water and treat one unit of residential wastewater? What is the nexus between the cost of service and the "Revenue Requirements?" Are there embedded in the proposed revenue requirements the cost of programs that are *not* core to the mission of the agency? Is the PUC doing too many things that do not benefit all ratepayers and are not core to its mission: funding Community Benefits Programs, paying for the wiggle, transferring rate-payer money to General Fund Departments, giving millions of dollars in grants to Rec & Park, paying non-profits, offering job training, buying refillable water bottles for the SFUSD, supporting the Southeast Community Center, and spending tens of millions of dollars on art.

The Water Task Force invited the SFPUC to write an article presenting their best case for raising rates at this time. Harlan Kelly, SFPUC General Manager submitted the following article.

Continuing Our Investments in Our Water and Sewer Systems

The San Francisco Public Utilities Commission delivers high quality water, generates clean hydropower, and collects and treats wastewater for the residents and businesses of San Francisco. We deliver these services 24 hours a day, while protecting the diverse Bay Area environment, community and economic interests that we all value. Our system operations and maintenance are 100 percent funded from the monthly bills you pay.

Nationwide, utilities are grappling with the problem of aging infrastructure. Fortunately, we've been hard at work implementing and planning for investments in our own water and sewer systems. These investments improve our resiliency to respond to the next earthquake, drought, or even the next Rim Fire. Over the past year, we have worked with an independent

rate panel and outside consultant, to determine that an average 8–9% increase in water and sewer bills is required to run our operations, and continue investing for today and our future.

Most of the proposed increases are funding our continuing work on the \$4.6 billion Hetch Hetchy Water System Improvement Program (WSIP). About a decade into one of the nation's largest water infrastructure programs, we are about 80% complete, and still trending very close to our original program budget. This is an amazing accomplishment for a program of this size with very complex projects. Our 2.6 million Bay Area customers are getting a reliable water supply lifeline that will help us restore system service for drinking and firefighting within 24 hours after a major earthquake. In addition, our improvements also will allow us to restore system storage

Land Use & Housing Committee Report

Hiroshi Fukuda convened the Regular Meeting of the CSFN Land Use & Housing Committee on Monday, February 10, 2014 at 5:50 P.M. in the Northern Police Station Community Room.

The Committee considered the following items

1. Recirculation of Portions of the 2004 and 2009 Housing Element Draft EIR (Chapter VII Alternatives)

Comments should be limited to the recirculated sections of the EIR in accordance with Section 15088.5(f)(2) of the CEQA Guidelines. Kathy Devincenzi forcefully informed the Planning Commission and Planning Department that the Court ruled that comments all Alternatives could be commented during the comment period, and that the hearing needed to be re-noticed properly and comment period extended for another 30–60 days. The Planning Commission voted to not re-notice the hearing, but Sarah Jones, the Environmental Review Officer, was told to consider extending the comment period. Ms Jones eventually agreed to extend the comment period another 15 days. Written comments should be addressed to Sarah B. Jones, Environmental Review Officer, San Francisco Planning Department, 1650 Mission Street, Suite 400, San Francisco CA 94103 or sarah.b.jones@sfgov.org. Comments that were received at the public hearing and in writing will be responded to in a Response to Comments

Copies of the revised Chapter VII Alternatives along with the full text of the EIR are available on the Planning Department website (tinyurl.com/sfceqadocs), and CDs and paper copies are available at the Planning Information Center (PIC) counter on the first floor of 1660 Mission Street, San Francisco.

2. **1634–1690** Pine The proposed project would merge the six lots into one parcel, demolish most of the existing five buildings on the project site, and construct one building with two 13-storey residential towers with commercial use on the ground and second floors. The existing building façades of three of the buildings would be restored and incorporated into the proposed project. The proposed building would have a total area of 353,360 gross square feet (gsf) and would include approximately 262 new residential units totaling approximately 221,760 sq ft, 5,600 sq ft of commercial space, and 34,600 sq ft of subterranean parking with 245 parking spaces on one level and 91 bicycle parking spaces. No off-street loading spaces are proposed. The proposed towers would be approximately 130 feet tall. Each of these two towers would have an elevator shaft. The project would have zero-lot-line setbacks along Pine and Franklin Streets.

Project is code-complying, but does it improve and enhance the neighborhood. Will there be any variances e.g. bulk, open space, window exposure?

- 4. Citywide Tenant Convention held last week was well attended by about 500 people, including six supervisors (John Avalos, David Campos, David Chiu, Malia Cohen, Jane Kim, and Eric Mar. Expect ballot propositions to protect renters from evictions and measures to provide affordable housing this year. The convention was the culmination of a series of neighborhood meetings across the city, and is a sign that a reenergized tenant movement is going to change local politics this year. There were so many young people, so much energy, such a feeling that the epidemic of evictions that is transforming communities is not inevitable. capacity and diversify our local water supplies to improve our ability to withstand future droughts.

Building off the success of the WSIP, we are also starting to focus on upgrades needed to our City's aging sewer system. Many components of the sewer system are past their useful life: more than 60 percent of the system's 1,000 miles of pipes are more than 80 years old and the City's main treatment facility requires seismic upgrades.

Currently, the Rate Fairness Board, representing different local ratepayer groups, is reviewing our new rate proposal. Proposition E, approved by San Francisco voters on November 5, 2002, established a Rate Fairness Board to advise the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission on water, power and sewer rate matters. The Rate Fairness Board reviews our five-year rate forecast and holds public hearings on rate recommendations before our Commission adopts rates. They also provide a report and recommendations to our Commission.

These recommendations as well as the proposed rate package will be presented to the SFPUC Commission on April 22, 2014 for review and to be considered for adoption by our Commission on May 13, 2014. If the rate package is approved, it will be submitted to the SF Board of Supervisors for a 30-day review period. If adopted, the new rates will be in effect starting July 1, 2014.

Todd Rydstrom, Assistant General Manager, Business Services, and Chief Financial Officer along with Tyrone Jue, Director of Communications, will be discussing the detailed rate proposal at your meeting on February 18th. I hope you can attend.

75 Howard Update

The oversized luxury condo high-rise proposed for the Embarcadero at 75 Howard Street is being delayed. It was scheduled to come before the Planning Department in mid-March. We will let you know when a new date has been set.

The New York developer has made changes. It is reported that it has reduced the height somewhat to 281-feet (plus a 17-foot tower/mechanical penthouse). 281-foot height would still be 40% over the height limit and higher than neighboring buildings. It's more than twice the height of 8 Washington.

It is our opinion that the 200-foot height limit is too tall anyway. That is also the limit of the inland parcel adjacent to 75 Howard, so these height limits seem to ignore requirements that buildings step down towards the bay.

Also, the developers no longer plan to help themselves to the small city-owned triangular parcel in front of their project.

How this project plays out will tell us if the Planning Commission is now listening to the people of San Francisco after 8 Washington was rejected.

Response to Mayor's Transportation Task Force Report

At our January 21st CSFN meeting, Jerry Cauthen of SaveMuni pointed out some of SaveMuni objections to the transportation plan put forward by the Mayor's hand-picked task force of city officials, labor union leaders, downtown business representatives and other special interest groups. SaveMuni notes that the plan allocates too much to bicycle facilities and "street enhancement," too little to Muni, and pays no attention to the significant demographic changes destined to affect San Francisco between now and 2040. Of the less than half of the total that would go to Muni, much was allocated to TEP changes of marginal usefulness and to such vague and ill-defined projects as "Muni Transit Fixed Guideway" and "SFMTA Facilities."

If, as expected, the General Obligation Bond and Vehicle License Fee increase needed to finance the Plan is placed on the November ballot, you will soon begin to see and hear the usual well-financed hype.

Excerpt from the New Planning Commission Rules

A presentation of the proposal by the Project Sponsor(s) team (includes sponsor (or their designee), lawyers, architects, engineers, expediters, and/or other advisors) would be for a period not to exceed (strike15) 10 minutes, unless a written request for extension not to exceed a total presentation time of 15 minutes is received at least 72 hours in advance of the hearing, through the Commission Secretary, and granted by the President or Chair.

c. A presentation of opposition to the proposal by organized opposition for a period not to exceed) (strike 15) 10 minutes (or a period equal to that provided to the project sponsor team) with a minimum of three (3) speakers. The intent of the 10 min block of time provided to organized opposition is to reduce the number of overall speakers that share similar concerns. The requestor should advise the group that the Commission would expect the organized presentation to represent their testimony, if granted. Organized opposition will be recognized only upon written application at least 72 hours in advance of the hearing, through the Commission Secretary, the President or Chair, to the President (through the Commission Secretary) prior to the hearing.


