We are grateful to our local media for the herculean job they have done this year. They exposed the facts that seem to elude many at City Hall. Important details about international drug market connections to our streets were uncovered. City Hall programs were analyzed and exposed as failures. High level corruption in many city departments brought criminal charges. Mis-use of funds among non-profits and contractors has lead to a lot of hearings.

SF Neighborhoods are Uniting: After a raucous re-districting process, the districts are more united than ever in their demands for a better government. We wrote letters, passed resolutions, and took positions on state and local bills as we tried to moderate some of the damage and more egregious power grabs. The callous treatment of merchants and residents has lead to demands for changes at SFMTA, Rec and Park, DBI and the permitting department among others.

Our Members Joined State Organizations: Some of our efforts were successful but 2023 ended with more pressures coming from Sacramento to forces unwanted changes on our communities. We will work with Livable California, Catalysts, and Our Neighborhood Voices in 2024 as we go into a difficult election season.

Catalysts helped us set up meetings with our State Representatives.
